A journey to discover their next favorite whiskey, if they like whiskey, or just partake in the event (because we're so much fun to hang out with.) Six whiskeys were blindly presented, sniffed, tasted and discussed. Not everyone agreed on everything, which was where it got interesting. The results are provided for you, in the order they were presented to our group, to use as a guide in your own journey.

<b>Breckenridge Bourbon Whiskey</b>	<p>Breckenridge, Colorado / Aged 3 years</p> <p>The distillery, which is only 4,000 square feet itself, is situated 9,600 feet above sea level, making it the highest distillery in the world. Breckenridge's master distiller ferments a mash of 56% corn, 38% rye and 6% malted barley in an open-top Scottish fermenter before distilling it twice through a \$140,000, 550-gallon, Vendome copper-pot still originally made in Kentucky. <b>Blade and Bow Kentucky Bourbon Whiskey</b>	<p>Louisville, Kentucky / Aged Unknown</p> <p>Blade and Bow Kentucky Straight Bourbon is crafted using a solera-aging, a process typically reserved for aging cognacs, ports and sherries. This is done to preserve the precious original stock of Stitzel-Weller, which is mingled with other fine whiskies during the solera process, during which a series of casks are filled at different intervals over a long period of time (in fact, Blade and Bow Kentucky Straight Bourbon contains the oldest remaining stock of whiskey distilled at Stitzel-Weller, and will be the last available liquid for sale that was distilled at the original distillery).</p> <p>As whiskey from the oldest cask is emptied and bottled, the cask is re-filled with an equivalent amount of whiskey from the second-oldest cask in the solera. This cascading effect continues until the youngest cask in the solera is filled with new whiskey. As a result, no cask in the solera is ever fully emptied. <b>Hirsch Small Batch Reserve Kentucky Straight Bourbon Whiskey</b>	<p>Bardstown, Kentucky / Aged 4-6 years</p> <p>A Kentucky straight bourbon that has been aged in new, charred American oak barrels for at least four years and is bottled at 92 proof.</p> <p>Named after Adolf Hirsch, a former executive of the Schenley Co. who bought some aging barrels of bourbon from the famed Michter's Distillery Distillery before it closed in 1988, Hirsch Small Batch Reserve earned the Double Gold Medal at the The Fifty Best Tasting Competition in 2012 and the Silver Medal at the WSWA Tasting Competition in 2011. In addition, it earned five stars from F. <b>Bib &amp; Tucker Small Batch Bourbon Whiskey</b>	<p>Sonoma, California / Aged 6-7.5 years</p> <p>Crafted from a mash of 70% corn, 26% rye and 4% malted barley. The grains, which were harvested in late 2006 and early 2007, were distilled twice - first through a column still and then through an old fashioned copper pot still.
